Parent Teacher Conferences

Every parent-teacher conference including virtual conferences are an opportunity to have a productive conversation about student progress and set realistic goals for student achievement. Preparing in advance helps to provide the most accurate information for adult decision making.

In a pandemic parent-teacher conferences occur on video calls, emails or phone contact. This requires teachers to have open communication on a regular basis before the actual conference to share data and work samples. Hampton Elementary School staff utilize Google meets, Google classroom, email, phone, website, newsletter and flyers. (Attached samples from this month). In reviewing with teachers skills for a positive productive Parent-Teacher conference there are many resources. Expectations from one set of recommendations that are commonly used at Hampton Elementary School are listed below.

- Use a rubric or agenda to make sure all topics are covered
- Be prepared with grades, scores and progress information
- Be flexible with time and type of communication/media
- Identify what your expectations are for the student
- Listen to the parent and be ready to follow-up with resources or guidance
- Set a time limit, don't keep other parents waiting

During Black History month and a tie-in to Women's History month, 6th grade students studied Black Artist Jacob Lawrence's Painting from his Migration Series: "Panel no. 57: The female workers were the last to arrive north." Show below. It was a wonderful opportunity to discuss what was happening with the emancipation of Black slaves and how that affected their individual lives. Students learned how to "read" a painting by asking critical questions like, "What do you see here?" "What is this painting about?" "How do you feel about the shapes, colors etc?" Students were then given an Art assignment to pick out a favorite famous artist and create a class presentation on the artist of their choice. They will be working on presentation skills, expressing themselves and sharing what they learned about their artist with their classmates.
